hree common issues exist in modern day Organisations - ineffective leadership, inadequate communication down the line and ongoing workplace

One often results in the other and together, they create organisations that are not as effective as they could be.

What workplace conflict occurs time after time?

Misunderstanding others, not listening well, personal agendas (a regular) and talking about people negatively are listed as some of the top reasons why good relationships at work suffer and conflict hangs around the office.

It happens in many organisations and at all levels, and when it does, productivity suffers.

Unhappy people make unhappy workplaces which in turn, affect the bottom line.

Common Causes of Workplace Conflict

There are various, with the most common being a lack of role clarity, unrealistic task expectations. unclear processes, systems and deadlines, power games, territorialism (this is my turf), unmet needs, no tolerance of diversity, the lack of effective communication and ineffective leadership styles that demoralise, not motivate, the people.

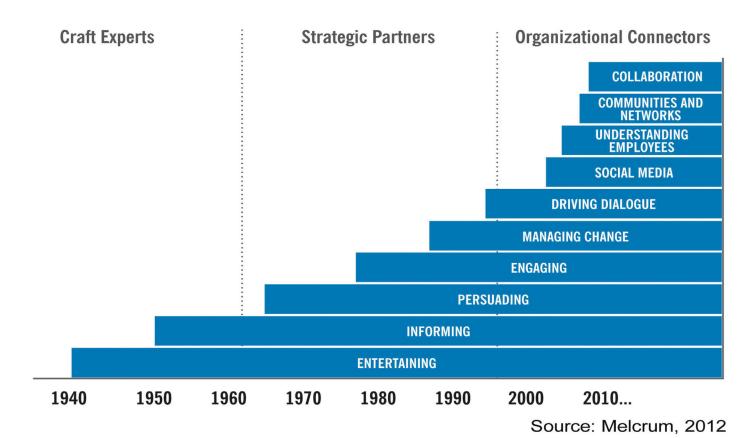

Conflict at work increases when ssues are not addressed, frustra tion grows over time, people start to pull away from each other (not uniting to solve problems they face) and slowly, productivity is affected and profitability is reduced.

Statistics

- 60 per cent 80 per cent of all Organisational workplace difficulties stem from strained relationships between employees
- Typically, a workplace manager spends 25 per cent - 40 per cent of their time dealing with workplace conflict. That amounts to two days each week. (Washington Business Journal, 2005)
- Ninety-six days each year of the manager's time is spent focusing on dealing

- The cost of replacing an employee is high. Ernst & Young reports the cost of losing and replacing an employee may be as high as 150 per cent of the de per cent parting employee's annual salary. This includes the manager's time in spent in training new employees (Workforce.com).
- Two-thirds of both men and women say work has a significant impact on their stress levels, and one in four has called in sick or taken a 'mental health day' because of work stress. (American Psychological Association, 2004)
- One-fourth of employees view their jobs as the number one stressor in their lives (North-Western National

Workplace Bullying – The Silent

Workplace bullying is the 'silent' epidemic in organisations, which has significant impact on the victim, the people around them and productivity overall.

The intentional, repeated behaviour directed at an employee or group to embarrass, humiliate or ungermine, there are no losers in bullying – for the victim, the bully or the organisation.

Everybody loses. Bullying is an outcome of a power and blame culture that has been allowed to grow

Specific workplace bullying and harassment for Fiji could not be obtained at the time of writing this article, but consider the information below as representative of any organisation, regardless of where it is.

No person being bullied can ever reach their potential or be highly performing in their role.

When organisations make it a priority to train employees in communication and listening skills, building trust, teambuilding, and conflict resolution skills, less unresolved conflicts will occur.

When employees feel their concerns are heard by management, job satisfaction and productivity increases which goes right to an organisation's bottom line.

Leaders - eight ways to create workplace harmony

1. If you are a leader, be the role model who leads their people to greatness.

Learn how to communicate well and connect with your people.

2. Create a culture of harmony and accepting diversity by ensuring you and all your people accept differences.

Set up organisation-wide training in communication skills and resolving conflict regularly.

- 3. Do not let conflict grow. Encourage your people to deal with issues as they arise.
- 4. Show interest in your people. They all have lives outside of the workplace. Take an active interest in what their interests are.
- 5. Introduce a 'zero tolerance to bullying' workplace policy and create processes to deal with this behavior when it arises.

6. Be optimistic in everytning you

- do and create a 'can do' attitude in your workplace. 7. Be approachable and manage
- your emotions well at all times. 8. Choose a leader (local or international) whom you admire. Model your behavior on theirs.
